BRITISH WESTINDIES.

The value of the slaves in the British Westindia Islands, is estimated at 12,500,000. sterling.—Lands and Houses 25,000,000.—Shipping 1,500,000. Total 33,000,000.—Tons of Shipping employed 300,000.—Seamen 25,000.—Exports and Imports 10,000,000. annually. Before the insurrection in St. Domingo, the French Westindia Islands were estimated at double the above total.

DANBURY, Aug. 18. Yesterday Peter Farning, an Irishman, and John Sharp, a Mulatto, were convicted before the Hon. Superior Court in this town, of Highway Robbery, and sentenced to confinement and hard labor in Newgate prison during their natural lives.—They took their departure for that place this morning.

HARTFORD, Aug. 27. Last Friday Mr. David Vibert, by the breaking of a plank, fell from the frame of a building in this town, when a piece of timber falling on his body just under the ribs, instantly put an end to his life. He belonged to East Hartford, and has left a widow and five children to lament his untimely death.

Another man who stood on the same plank had his leg broke, and a third was more slightly wounded.

On Sunday the 19th inst. arrived at Philadelphia, the ship Perseverance, Captain Boys, from Havre de Grace, which she left the 20th of June. We have only time to make the following extract of a letter from Havre de Grace of the 17th of June.

"With respect to our markets, but little alteration has taken place since our last, but our exchange with all foreign parts has taken considerable rise, and we think will be much higher, at least for a short time, if the news, just received in town by private letters, and by this day's paper, be true, which says that on the 12th inst. a general engagement took place between the Austrians and the French army under M. de la Fayette, in which the Austrians were beaten, with the loss of 2000 men left on the field of battle, besides 18 pieces of cannon.

"Should the intelligence be authenticated, which we are inclined to believe will be, from the manner in which it is received, there is no doubt but our exchange will take a further rise; but we do not think it can stand long above 28 on London; and in the same proportion on other places.

We further learn that the Austrian forces were drawing fast towards the French Frontiers; that M. de la Fayette was killed in a skirmish on the 12th of June; that there had been a rupture with the French ministry; and that the minister at war, The Baron de
